Our ships also visit lands with fascinating wildlife. Imagine having Jack Hanna, one of America's most beloved naturalists and host of a hit television series, along to tell you about the wildlife of Antarctica; or learning about the giant crocodiles of Australia from Joan Embery, a frequent guest on The Tonight Show; or exploring

On the Marco Polo's Antarctic expeditions, a leader is Nigel Sitwell, the internationally recognized naturalist who has won royal honors for his work in conservation, led more than 30 expeditions to Antarctica, and drafted the guidelines of conduct followed by all visitors to the White Continent.

Learn about Antarctica's wildlife from field zoologist Dr. Peter Carey, who has spent a lifetime studying polar creatures such as Adelie penguins and south polar skuas. Peter Hillary, explorer son of the Mount Everest conqueror, follows in his father's footsteps as a lecturer for Orient Lines. Peter made international headlines in January 1999 when,




with two other ski trekkers, he battled blizzards, frostbite, and illness to forge a new overland route to the South Pole. Peter and his father were the first father-and-son team to reach the summit of Mount Everest.

Other Antarctic expeditions have included Jackie Ronne, the first American woman to set foot on the White Continent. Her husband traveled to Antarctica with Admiral Richard Byrd, and her father-in-law


discovered the South Pole on an expedition with Roald Amundsen.

Guests have also thrilled at the tales of Bill Kerns, the U.S. Navy pilot who survived for over two weeks on the ice after his plane crashed in Antarctica, and the British adventurer Geoff Somers, who made a 220-day, 4,000-mile trek across Antarctica's widest point. Many of our guest lecturers have hailed from the fields of journalism, policy, and diplomacy. Such noted journalists as Bernard Kalb or Peter Arnett have briefed our passengers on the political scene. They have also learned about South American politics from U.S. diplomat Stephen Dachi, who carried out the investigation that led to the positive identification of a notorious Nazi war criminal.
